









Christchurch Food Bank+ Life Centre

Introduction

A year on from the refurbishment the Food Bank is noticeably busier, and our Life Centre is thriving. Our cafe- style area means we now have an informal and welcoming space for visitors to sit with a drink and chat through the reasons for needing our services.

Our Life Centre provides space where food support. help with debt, support for those experiencing homelessness, and signposting to external services can all happen in one place.

This enables the team to work through any root issues that need to be addressed, and together work out what practical steps need to be taken.

In addition to food parcels, we continue to provide fresh fruit and vegetables, lunch bags, toiletries and our 'Meal

in a Bag' containing a recipe and all the ingredients needed to make this.

Throughout January we supplied many families with a slow cooker and individuals and couples with a soup kettle.



Our team has grown again with Lucy Hurley joining our team to provide administration support.

Our team of 42 dedicated volunteers also continue to provide invaluable support.

Our ultimate aim is to walk alongside our visitors as they

journey through our projects until they no longer need us.

Some of those who first came for support now drop in for a coffee and a chat, while others are now volunteering in our projects, providing support to others as they walk on their journey out of crisis.

One woman came in to the Life Centre in tears – as Tracy sat down with her she explained her cooker had blown up, and while she had managed to replace this, she had used all her income up in the process.

Tracy organised for the seller to provide a refund, which paid for the new cooker, which then freed up money for her

"If we didn't have the Life Centre this lady would have simply come in for a food parcel and then left without sharing about the real reason for needing food support in the first place.

With the space to chat and receive further support, she was able to return home and not need the Food Bank again." – Tracy.







CMA Debt Advice & Budget Support



Briar Harley joined our team this year as the CMA Team Lead in Christchurch. Working closely with the Food Bank, they provide free debt advice and budget support to those who need it.

The production of our 'Where Does My Money Go' leaflet has meant that many approaching us for budget support have been able to work through this without needing further support...

We have also introduced a new Complex Benefits Advisor to support those who are employed and those unable to work.

More Help Than I Could Have Imagined

David* and his five children, after fleeing their home due to domestic violence, were referred to us for food and assistance with furniture by the school.

We were able to provide beds for the children, a cooker, fridge freezer and a kitchen pack including cups, plates, crockery and saucepans, as well as everything needed to build a home. Once the property was furnished we arranged for carpets to be fitted.

David had to give up work to look after his children. We invited him in to discuss access to The Hardship Fund and our Faithworks CMA team for debt advice and budget support.

We provided support with setting up utility bills, shopping, food and with finding local schools for his children to attend.

We stayed with him as learnt how to parent on his own, and support his children as they processed the changes they had been through.

We provided further support over Christmas to help make life a little easier. We provided a turkey dinner as well as a Christmas hamper. The family were also invited to our Christmas Community Supper.

We continued to work closely with the schools' pastoral workers and social services to ensure the family received all the help possible. Tracy said:

"It's so rewarding to see Dad organised and the children settled as we continue to walk with them on their journey out of crisis."

Community Supper

"This is the only time I eat my dinner off a plate with others." - Steve

We began the Community Suppers in March 2022. After Covid and lockdown we realised that people need to come back together to do community.

"This is the only meal I don't eat alone."

It is open to anyone. The youngest that comes is two months old and the oldest is 83 years old. Everyone sits together.

A "friend" at each table ensures everyone feels welcome and included.

Slow Cookers & Soup Kettles

Over 80 slow cookers and soup kettles have been provided over the last year, along with our recipe cards which included meals such as the 'Leftover Roast Dinner Soup' which has been very popular! Slow cookers and soup kettles require less energy to power, therefore helping to save a little on fuel costs.

"Try before you buy"

In times when food is so expensive, it is important not to waste money on trying new foods that families do not want to eat. This is particularly vital for children when trying new foods.

Our Meal in a Bag enables people to try new recipes without spending money on ingredients. If the recipe is a success, then it can be made time and again with confidence that everyone in the home will enjoy it.

One mum with three sons loved the Sausage Casserole Meal in a Bag so much that it is one of their favourite recipes now. This mum explained that they would never have tried the recipe if it had not been for the Meal in a Bag as the ingredients would have been too expensive to risk trying.

862 people came to one of our Community Suppers last year.



From Sleeping in the Woods to Home

We first met Craig* when he was sleeping rough in a tent in the woods. We provided him with a dry sleeping bag and a bag of food. We encouraged him to bring his laundry to the Food Bank to be washed and dried.

We also provided new underwear and boots. Craig did not trust anyone but slowly he started to drop in to pick up gas bottles for his stove and other small items.

Craig has been coming to the Food Bank for over 7 years. It has taken a long time for him to learn to trust the team and for us to build a relationship with him.

Occasionally we would be able to provide a bed in a Travelodge through our Sponsor A Night In scheme, especially when Craig was unwell.

SWEP (Severe Weather Emergency Protocol) was activated at the end of 2022, where the government provide a bed for those sleeping rough during extreme weather. We encouraged Craig to engage with this and following this agreed to try living indoors with the support of Christchurch Food Bank+ and supported accommodation.

Two months later Craig is still living in his accommodation and continues to pop in to see us when he needs a friendly face or a little encouragement that 'he can do this'.

Furniture Bank

"It's more than just furniture, it made me and my children's house a home, after we escaped domestic violence"

Social services, BCP Housing Resettlement team and Sovereign Housing all refer to Christchurch Food Bank+. Those referred are moving into unfurnished properties following homelessness, domestic violence, living in temporary housing or following relationship breakdown. Items range from fridge-freezers, beds and bedding, to a whole home of furniture.

The Furniture Bank cost £31K last year, £16K of this came from grants and the rest from donations and gifts in kind such as donated furniture items.

Our Coat Rack & Shoe Box

The idea for this came about when a young woman came to the Food Bank without a coat during the bitterly cold winter weather.

We worked out that the average price for a coat is £60 which is unaffordable for many coming to the Food Bank. Our Coat Rack and Shoe Box was born out of this.

Those visiting the Life Centre are able to choose a coat and pair of shoes if needed. We have set this up discreetly in the cafe area so that visitors can do so with dignity. We also have a stock of sleeping bags, toiletries and hot water bottles kindly donated by a local group.
